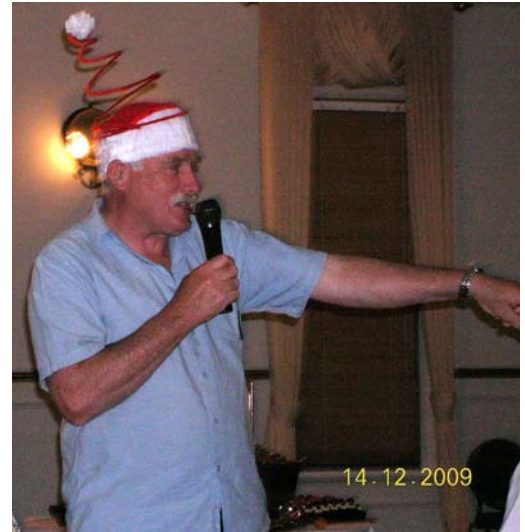

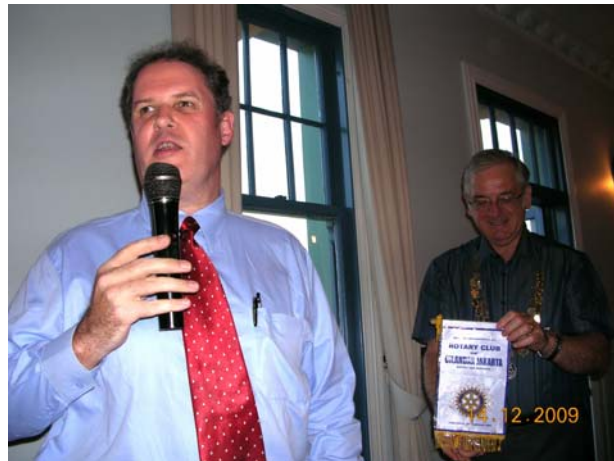

Club Notices

Rod Fergusson gave us an update on the 2009 Charity Golf Tournament. He advised that (subject to Lynette Miller's audit) the net proceeds from the 2009 Charity Golf Tournament will now exceed last year's record result thanks to an increase in the grant from the Chenerey Memorial Trust.

The net sum raised was \$23,067.00 of which \$500 was donated to Waitemata Junior Golf.

Trust grants amounted to \$4,000 leaving \$26,567.00 for the Rotary Club to distribute.

Graham Rice gave us an update on the 2010 Charity Yacht Regatta with the good news that the primary sponsor has been confirmed and he distributed mock-ups of the new brochure.

Below is President Don's entertaining address given last Monday evening:-

Twelve days – Rotary – A Revised Policy

Effective immediately, because of bureaucratic necessity for a greater vision of not fully knowing where we are going the following measures are being implemented but only after consultation with the International directors, the policy convention, International Assembly, Rotary International Directors of Zones 7A, 7B, and 8, District Governors and Clubs' Board of Directors, and of course Club forum the "Twelve Days of Christmas" have been slightly altered to give greater flexibility, autonomy, accountability and immediacy in about two years:

1) ***The Partridge or President*** may be retained, but as an Aunt Sally. However the pear tree, which never produced the cash crop forecasted, will be replaced by a plastic replica. This will provide considerable savings in maintenance. Upon this authentic plastic fruit tree photos of all honorary members, are to be hung and thus their true value will be seen as ornaments which bring nostalgic reminders of a more glorious past – the way we used to do it.

2) ***Two Turtle Doves*** or treasury positions represent a redundancy that is simply not cost effective. In addition, their likely closer liaison during treasurers' working hours beggars consideration. The positions are, therefore, eliminated, all transactions will be electronic and the Secretary who, judging by the volume of emails does not have enough to do, will handle all financial inquiries. Refunds will cease thus pay off any excess expenditure over income for the Club. All details on how to do it will be found on the web-site if you can find the website and can navigate your way round it

3) The ***Three French Hens*** pandering to a certain French cock of the walk will remain intact. After all, everyone loves the French and besides, who else would we have to blame?

4) The ***Four Calling Birds*** [another name for secretary], will be replaced by an automated voice mail system, with a call waiting option. An analysis is underway to determine who the birds have been calling, how often and how long they talked [or is it emailed?]. Automotive, late night text messaging is an option worth considering. The four options will be:

1. Press one for the last email sent to you
2. Press two for the volume of emails sent this year,
3. Press three for number of emails you have not responded to thus far
4. Press four for email therapy

5) The ***Five Golden Rings*** [or is it Olympic rings?], the dream-like inspiration of Rotary marathon walkers with their rent a crowd support, have been put on hold by the Board of Directors while they look into the practicality of maintaining a portfolio based on smelly feet and sweaty bodies which could have negative implications for institutional charitable investors and long term strategic plans based on selective breeding and natural selection. Diversification into other smelly options with most doing the thinking and dreaming, a few do the actual walking, while the rest take trips in their minds as they practice their daily exercise of side-stepping responsibility, pushing their luck, jumping to conclusions, and running down others, while walking across well planned planning events. Are ventures into virtual exercises, raising fund, for virtual projects from virtual business for virtual charities the way of our virtual future?

6) The ***Six Geese-a-Layin'*** is a failed fund-raising project driven by the Fund Raising Team and constitutes a luxury which can no longer be afforded. It has long been felt that the production rate of one egg per goose per day was an example of the general decline in productivity. Three geese will be let go, and an upgrading in the selection procedure for future members by the Club development team will assure Directors that, from now on, every goose it gets will be a good one

7) The ***Seven Swans-a-Swimmin'*** is obviously a number chosen in better times, and is a long term International project that needs to be re-considered, if such a process can be undertaken when change is needed but without letting go of traditions and the past. The swimming geese are primarily decorative activities. Mechanical swans are on order. The current swans will be retrained to make us look good and for them to learn some new strokes, thereby enhancing their outplacement

8) As you know, the ***Eight Maids-a-Milkin'*** concept has been under heavy scrutiny by Rotary as it seeks to expand its vocational basis. A male/female balance in the Membership is being sought. The more active members consider a-milkin' a dead-end job with no upward mobility. Automation of the process may permit such members to try a-mendin', a directin', a-mentorin' or a-mulchin', even a-thinkin'. Multi-taskin' for most would be a new experience, thus we need to celebrate our latest member who is Young, female, and Asian. Now the challenge is to get a one-eyed [a Canterbrian will do], open minded [a national populist politician], three-legged, Castralto singing and dancing drag queen

9) ***Nine Ladies a-Dancin'*** has always been an attraction for possible functions such as this, but there is a problem which the Fellowship team are seeking to address, they run into gender

issues and the danger of stereotyping. Morris dancing just does not have the appeal of the cheerleading, although maybe better for ageing hearts. Now what they need is a Titanic Denominational approach as used when the Iceberg was struck: the Salvationist struck up the band, the Baptist burst into song, the Charismatics began praying which nobody could understand, the Catholics sought Reconciliation through Confession, the Jews wailed O God, why us – again, the Moslems said there is nothing they could do – it is the will of Allah, the Buddhists and Hindus prayed there was something in re-incarnation, the atheist and Agnostics wished there was a God, the Methodist sought counseling for the Iceberg for having hit the ship, the Anglicans set up a sub-committee to look into the matter, the Presbyterians sensing panic calls order, order, before taking up an offering and adjourning for a cup of tea.

12) ***Twelve Drummers a-Drummin'*** has already been replaced by the programmer who drums up 12 months of programming. This task could be made simpler by virtual presenters, recorded one year and played the next, and it could all be on I-pod, or face book and we would not need to meet at all so save money by not having to worry about meals.

Overall we can expect a substantial reduction in assorted people, fowl, animals and related expenses. While an increase in the virtual world of virtually having a virtual Rotary organisation that looks after virtual people from virtually every cultural group and doing projects virtually. In the virtual world virtually anything is possible.

Regarding the lawsuit filed by the attorney's association seeking expansion to include the legal profession ("thirteen lawyers-a-suing"), a decision is pending. In the meantime this project is deeply buried [some 20 feet] as deep down lawyers a good people.
